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## Fox's PCB count mounts

Treatment plants, new mills linked to pollution

PCB discharges to the Fox River may be three times higher than recent predictions, according to a state report released Thursday that also expands the list of potential polluters.

The draft report by the state Department of Natural Resources estimates that total PCB discharges to the river between 1984 and today range from 420,000 pounds to 1,260,000 pounds — up from earlier estimates of 280,000 pounds.

The report also identifies, for the first time, 17 new activities believed to have contributed very large amounts of polychlorinated biphenyls to the river.

Those sources — paper mills, public sewage districts — are listed in addition to seven Fox River paper mills that the federal government already holds chiefly responsible for the contamination. Among the newly identified are Green Bay Packaging Inc., Paper Products Co., Paper Products Co., and the Fox River Sewerage District, and the Fox River Sewerage District.

"The department expects a great deal of interest in this report," states the cover letter accompanying the document. "Fox River and Green Bay PCB PCB and Transport Inventory." The stakes are high for those linked to PCBs found in the Fox River.

## House OKs private school tax breaks

Clinton promises to veto bill

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The bill would expand tax-free savings accounts that Congress created last year, with Clinton's threat to veto the measure.

Republicans and others could contribute up to \$10,000 a year on a child's behalf, up from \$5,000 for a single child. The amount would be \$10,000 for a second child.

The Senate is expected to use fast-track procedures to pass the bill.

Regardless of the final outcome, Clinton's move is seen as a way to deliver an education message to voters.

The bill would allow parents to deduct up to \$2,000 a year for private school tuition, up from \$1,000. The deduction would be available for children under 18.

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## Storm topples circus tent; 12 hurt

A circus tent with a show under way collapsed under high winds, sending a dozen injured to La Crosse hospitals, as a line of severe storms blasted its way across Wisconsin late Thursday.

The storm "straggler" winds also toppled trees and power lines in the La Crosse area, according to a dispatcher for the La Crosse County Sheriff's Department who declined to give the name.

"We had a circus under the big top and all the La Crosse County Fairgrounds (in West Salem) and all the people in the tent," he said.

"The responder was just starting to introduce an act, and he happened to look at the side of the tent and saw it lifting up in the air."

A ringmaster with the Red Dasher Circus told WISN-TV of La Crosse that about 100 people were in the audience when the tent went down.

The ringmaster said he did not report in long jumps, the Mackintosh outfit and wire cages both and injured seven people were taken to the emergency room at La Crosse hospital, Gudmund Luthers, but there was no immediate word on their condition.

Starting at Red Brothers Circus in La Crosse after winds knocked down the tent, the circus was taken to the hospital for treatment, spokesman Kevin Butler said.
