Wiesel lecture moved to larger building

Elle Wiesel, Holocaust survivor and Nobel Peace Prize winner, will deliver a two-hour Tuesday Sept. 11 at St. Norbert College. Wiesel's lecture from the college to move to the larger Schukla Sports Center. Wiesel was 13 when his family was deported from Romania by the Nazis and sent to the Auschwitz concentration camp. He was separated from his mother and sister there, and never saw them again. Wiesel and his father were later sent to Buchenwald where his father died.

It was not until 1984 that he wrote of his experiences in *Le Jour d'un Juif* (A Day as a Jew), which was translated into English.

Wiesel, now a humanism professor at Boston University and U.S. citizen, won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1986.

Wiesel will speak at 7:30 p.m. as part of the Louis Miller Memorial Lecture. His lecture, "Confronting Evil: The Holocaust and the Jewish People," is free, but tickets are required.

Probe into infant's camp death continues

Police were investigating Monday the death of a 6-month-old boy in a campground.

Michael Allen Mansfield, of Hastings, Minn., was found not breathing by his mother Sunday morning at Hoffman Park camping area in River Falls. Police said.

An autopsy was performed on the body Monday at the Ramsey County medical examiner's office in Minnesota, but results were not immediately available, the coroner's office said.

Jeff Linehan, a juvenile officer of the River Falls Police Department, would not say whether authorities suspected foul play in the child's death.

DNR suspects bear caused injury to horse

Department of Natural Resources officials are investigating whether a bear hit a horse that was chased by about 40 strikes was caused by a bear.

Tom Wright, the owner of the 9-year-old mare named Brown, and his wife, Ruth, called the DNR after Ruth noticed the animal's wound Saturday.

A warden from the U.S. Department of Wildlife Service was scheduled to visit the Wrights' home Monday. DNR spokesman Dave Weitz said.

The DNR expected to receive a report from the U.S. Wildlife Service on Tuesday, Weitz said.

"If this is in fact an animal's causing the problem, we'll do everything we can to make sure it's controlled," Weitz said.

Wright, who said he's never seen a bear in the area, also said he has no doubt that a bear injured the horse.

Earlier this month, a 14-year-old boy Scott was severely injured when a black bear attacked his tent in Washburn County.

The bear suspected of attacking the attack was destroyed.

REPORT/Outlines effect on river dredging of PCBs near Fort James under way

The first Patrick Henry Martin Memorial Estuary Scenic and Golf tournament got off to a dramatic start on Monday when Albert Einstein (Green Bay's Max Frost in the tournament) and record-setting golfer Dick Futala landed at Onondaga Golf and Country Club ahead of a hail of competitors.

The Estuary Project is a program dedicated to improving the quality of water, science and technology education in Northwestern Wisconsin.

measures of PCB activity, including PCB levels determined in fish and bird tissues from the river and in sediment, and the presence of PCBs in the bay and the "signature" or fingerprint of individual PCBs and how they have degraded over time.

The agency used this information to develop the remedial plan. — Followed by article from 1997-7.

The dredging is being done by the state-owned Fort James Corp.'s West Mill in Fish Creek. The project is being paid for by the Fox River Group of paper companies.

The area is believed to contain four pounds of PCBs, the largest concentration in the lower Fox River.

PCBs, or polychlorinated biphenyls, were widely used in the making of carbonless paper and other products at paper mills along the Fox until the government banned them in the 1970s.

Studies have linked PCBs to cancer, reproductive problems and poor mental development in children and said they are hazardous to aquatic life.

"First, we want to protect wildlife and human health by removing PCBs from the aquatic environment. And second, we want to improve the quality of the estuary area by dredging and cleanup," said Bob Habicht, project manager for the state Department of Natural Resources.

The \$9 million dredging project is designed to remove up to 100,000 cubic yards of sediment.

All of the material that comes from the site is to be in a landfill owned by Fort James on Wisconsin 177 in Brown County just west of Onondaga Village and Castro.

Work on the project was to begin Thursday but was delayed until this week while the contract performance tests on the equipment.

"Initially, we knew the fish were traveling to and from these waters," he said. "This report gives us scientific proof."
