**'Oops!' is no mistake on album charts**

NEW YORK — Pop singer Britney Spears is all smiles as she arrives at a Grammy party Feb. 22 in Beverly Hills, Calif.

The two pop star set a one-week sales record for a female artist with her second album, "Oops... I Did It Again." In its first week on the market, it sold 1.5 million copies, according to SoundScan. It will make its debut at No. 1 on the Billboard charts, just like her first album, "...Baby One More Time." Spears' "Oops" is the second fastest-selling album ever. Sony's "No Strings Attached" set a sales record of 1.4 million copies in its first week on the market earlier this spring.

The sales figures prove the dominance of teen pop in the music marketplace. The disc with the third-highest one-week sales was the Backstreet Boys' "Millennium," which sold 1.1 million copies.

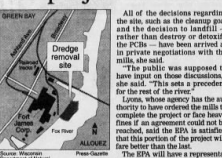
**Another hurdle awaits China trade bill in Senate**
