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**No progress in West Bank handover**

**JERUSALEM** — Israel and the Palestinians ended Saturday to receive a dispute over implementing a U.S.-brokered peace deal, announcing on progress had grinding to meet again the next day. Prime Minister Ehud Barak, and chief Palestinian negotiator Yassir Arafat met for three hours Saturday night in the latest in a series of negotiations about implementing the "Wye River interim peace accord."

The two agreed to meet again today in the Gaza Strip, Barak spokeswoman Norel Elzaid said. She refused to divulge any further details of Saturday's meeting.

The two sides apparently agreed in disagreement over the timetable for completion of land handover in the West Bank. It had wanted part of the handover delayed, while the Palestinian refused.

The two sides have agreed to start the clock taking Sept. 1 as the deadline for completion of the handover, which was done by the government of Israel's predecessor, the Palestinian Authority, in a deal signed in 1995. The deal calls for the United States to ensure the accord was implemented in a timely fashion.

**Simple monument erected**

**Cross is only visible reminder of JFK Jr. crash**

**AQUINNAH, Mass.** — On a beach near John F. Kennedy Jr.'s crash site stands a low, unimposing monument to the death of John F. Kennedy Jr. It's white and has a simple cross fashioned from pieces of driftwood.

"I had to come and see it," said Stephen O'Leary 37, of Hanson, one of about a dozen people visiting the cross on a recent morning. "It's a great site," said 20-year-old Kim Noonan, standing at the edge of the cross. "It's still back to believe."

Nearly a month after their deaths, the simple monument is about the only place to remember Kennedy's parents are buried at Aquinnah National Cemetery, which drew nearly 4.5 million visitors last year.

But the 28-year-old Kennedy, Carolyn Bouquet Kennedy, 30, and Lauren Bouquet, 31, were buried in the North Attleborough, Mass., where they were born.

The single-engine Piper Seneca airplane he was piloting crashed into the ocean about 1.6 miles from the shore on Saturday night. Kennedy was flying on the night of July 16, following a flight from Boston to Cape Cod.

The crash was evaded by several moments and was not reported until Sunday.

**Defense attorneys: Shooting suspect mentally unstable**

**COLUMBIANA, Ala.** — A man accused of fatally shooting three people at two offices he worked at is "not just very clever, but also very mentally unstable," defense attorneys said Friday.

A Shelby County grand jury on Friday indicted Alan Eugene Miller, 41, on one count of capital murder.

Miller is accused of opening fire at Ferguson Enterprises and Post-Apart as it opened on Aug. 5, killing Lee Holdbrooks, 32; Christopher Scott Vance, 38; and Terry Jarvis, 36.

A capital murder conviction carries a penalty of other life in prison without possibility of parole on the death penalty. Shelby County District Attorney Robby Owens said he would "absolutely" seek the death penalty.
