Green Bay cop arrested in wife's death

Aron detective picked up in Las Vegas; body found Feb. 11 in burning home

John R. Maloney, 41, a Green Bay police detective and former investigator, was arrested Monday night in Las Vegas, Nev., on charges involving the death of his wife. He is suspected in the death of Brenda Maloney, 48, who died Feb. 11 in an arson fire at the couple's east side home at 565 Hill St. Maloney was to appear today before a magistrate in Nevada, which time Maloney was to reveal whether he intended to return to Wisconsin for the trial.



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"We had someone go bad, but we got on it and took care of it."

Green Bay Police Chief James Lewis said that Detective John R. Maloney had been on an administrative leave since his wife's death, but had been suspended with pay about two weeks ago. "I can't tell you what he will be charged with specifically," Lewis said. "He has been arrested for the death of his wife."

conclude. The discussion before the county's month and next to whether the county parks department will acquire the trail for the state.

If the county declines to participate, the state or another entity such as a conservation group could acquire the trail, said Gary Hansen of the Department of Natural Resources.

Shore's support of the trail was shared by everyone who spoke during the question-and-answer period of the meeting. Trail opponents filed out comments on booklets at a table at the meeting and then complained after the meeting about the trail, driving through the property. Few spoke during the meeting in opposition to the trail.

One who did was Rockland's Ron Hoken, who worried rural residents would find themselves on their own if they have problems with trespassing or littering on the property.

"You're the one selling this, but we have reservations as to whether along the way, it seems like you're not the one you're going to have to go to," she said.

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Most of that expense should come from user fees and state grants, Hansen said.

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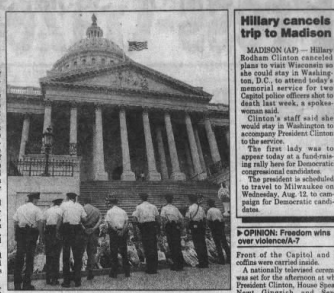
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Nation Slain officers honored in D.C.

Group: Congress weakens privacy

Washington (AP) — In the office, on the phone, at the grocery store and even in connection with psychiatric, private health records, says a public interest group.

"Congress seems to have substantially aided the invaders of privacy, not the public."

Charles Lewis, director of the Center for Public Integrity, said in a study released today, House lawmakers have weakened consumer privacy laws.

The Financial Services industry gave \$2 million to congressional candidates during the 1996 election cycle, and hospitals, health maintenance organizations and pharmaceutical companies gave \$1 million more, said the center.
