CD-quality albums to be available via Internet Associates Press

NEW YORK — In a major move to protect the music industry from online file sharing, five leading record companies are teaming up with IBM to test technology that lets people quickly record CD-quality albums of their own.

Beginning in the spring, IBM's new technology will be made available to about 1,000 people in San Diego, ENG Entertainment, EMI Recorded Music, Sony Music Entertainment, Universal Music Group and Warner Music Group will create an online music store to sell 1200 albums.
