Suspect seeks to
withdraw plea**

A 30-year-old Green Bay man is seeking to withdraw a no-contest plea to a charge of first-degree intentional homicide.
A hearing on the motion has been scheduled for 10 a.m. Tuesday, Aug. 18.
South and Debra Kummer, 15, both had been charged in connection with a shooting shooting on Green Bay's east side.
Kummer pleaded no contest on May 23 in exchange of being paroled to the charge of first-degree intentional homicide.
Smith leads the motion to withdraw his plea because he and his lawyer had initially been told that Smith and Kummer both would be charged with attempted homicide, according to documents filed in Brown County Court.
Kummer's attorney said that Kummer was charged with attempted homicide on May 7.
The charge of attempted first-degree intentional homicide carries a maximum sentence of 15 years, though prosecutors had said they would ask for more than 20 years in prison.
The motion may change the charges to a maximum 10-year sentence. Additional time can be added to the sentence for use of a weapon.
Kummer's sentencing is set for Friday.

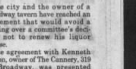
